Synopsis:

Counselling for Addictions is a Level 2 course that provides an overview of the theories and models, prevalent and contributing factors, psychological and social issues associated with substance and behavioural addictions, such as alcohol, drug use disorders and gambling disorder. Special emphasis is placed on assisting students to acquire the 12 core functions of an addiction counsellor, including screening, intake, assessment, client education, treatment planning and case management. This is an introductory course to addiction counselling, and it is designed to provide students with the generic knowledge, principles and skills that they can use to help people with a substance or behavioural addiction in today's rapidly changing world.
